

FACT:

Each year over 45,000 migrant and seasonal farmworkers work in Michigan.

FACT:

According to the Michigan Department of Community Health, there were only 3 reported incidents of pesticide exposure in the entire state in 2006.

FACT:

In a series of focus groups conducted by the Washington State Department of Health, nearly 75 percent of farmworkers reported experiencing symptoms of pesticide exposure.

FACT:

Michigan and Washington have similar crops and pest management systems; so there should not be a huge difference in the percentages of farmworkers exposed to pesticides in these states.

Do the math!

3 cases out of 45,000?

75 % of 45,000 = 33,750

**PESTICIDE ACTION
CAMPAIGN**

- The Pesticide Action Campaign was started in September 2007 with the goal of encouraging farmworkers to report pesticide exposures.
- When pesticide exposures go unreported, it is hard to convince policy makers that pesticide exposure is a serious Michigan problem.
- When Michigan's reporting statistics reflect reality, more effective steps can be taken to stop pesticides from harming farmworkers and their families.

WHAT ARE PESTICIDES?

- Pesticides are chemicals used to kill pests. They are most commonly used in agriculture.
- Farmworkers are the group most affected by pesticide exposure.

If you are experiencing symptoms such as:

Nausea

Skin rashes

Headaches

Eye irritation/Blurred vision

Difficulty Breathing

Numbness or tingling in your limbs

PESTICIDES MAY BE THE CAUSE!

GO to the nearest medical clinic immediately.

WHAT YOUR EMPLOYER MUST DO TO PROTECT YOU:

- Give you pesticide training in your language
- Provide you with water, soap and towels in the fields
- Keep labor housing at least 50 ft. away from the fields
- Post a list of pesticides that have been used in the fields
- Take any workers exposed to pesticides to the nearest medical facility

It is your **RIGHT** to:

- Demand that your employer protect you from pesticide exposure
- Take legal action if you have been exposed

REPORT ALL CASES OF PESTICIDE EXPOSURE!
