What Workers Should Expect From Employers



Safety

- ✓ Prevent Insects and Rodents in Housing and Common Laundry, Shower, Toilet, and Kitchen Areas
 - Clean mattresses on supported bed frames
 - Screens on all doors and windows that open
- ✓ Heating before June and after August

✓ Toilet Maintenance

- Toilets are kept in working condition
- Toilet seats are clean
- Portable toilets are pumped at least once per week
- Sewage is not running off on the ground

✓ Garbage Maintenance

- Durable, covered trash containers are available
- Containers are emptied at least once per week

Sanitation



Healthy Living Conditions

✓ Adequate Space

- 100 square feet of floor space per person


✓ Sleeping Areas

- Men and women have separate sleeping areas
- Families have their own separate sleeping areas

✓ Restrooms and Showers

- Toilets and showers for each family OR for each sex
- At least 1 shower per 10 individuals
- Showers are in the unit or 200 feet from the house

Privacy



✓ Water

- Hot and cold, contamination-free, running water must be available inside all living units
- Clean and sanitary bathing facility with pressurized hot and cold water
- 1 double laundry tub with pressurized, hot & cold water per 30 individuals
